About the Military Academies: Although each military academy has its own entrance requirements, applicants compete for admission on a national level for a very limited number of openings. All those accepted receive government-sponsored tuition that covers four to five years of academic, military, and physical education to prepare them for leadership as officers in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, or Coast Guard. Cadets also receive a monthly allowance to cover personal costs such as uniforms, books and personal items. Upon graduation, all will fulfill a minimum service requirement of 4 or 5 years, depending on the regulations of the academy they attended.
